DID YOU KNOW? When The "Waycross Victory" Ruled The High Seas

Waycross and Ware County men and women did more than their share to aid the effort in World War II. A little known chapter in that effort was the building of the "Waycross Liberty." Many Ware Countians drove daily to Brunswick to work in the Brunswick Shipyards, but the city's namesake wasn't built in Brunswick, but in Baltimore.

The namesake of Waycross on the high seas, the S. S. Waycross Victory, 456 feet long, a sleek and speedy cargo ship vessel later to be converted to a troopship, will soon be ready to take her place on sea lanes to our armed forces overseas.

The "Waycross Victory" which was built at the Bethlehem-Fairfield Shipyard, Baltimore, Md., successfully passed a series of ridged tests on her trial trip in Chesapeake Bay.

For 9 ½ hours the "Waycross Victory" was put through her paces by a trial crew from the Bethlehem-Fairfield Shipyard. A painstaking crew of technical experts were continuously busy recording data taken from various measuring devices aboard the ship while a "show me" group of Maritime Commission inspectors passed on the performances indicated. When the ship finally rode into the shipyard dock around 4:30 p.m., she bore the stamp of approval of the Maritime Commission's trial board.

Included among the multitude of tests the "Waycross Victory" was called to execute were: a six hour endurance run, a "crash" stop which puts the ship's turbine engines in reverse immediately following a full speed ahead, anchor tests, rudder steering tests, and a full speed astern performance.

Capt. Carl Norman, who will command the "Waycross Victory" was aboard the vessel during its recent trial run and was a most interesting passenger.

The ship was the first of a series of Victory ships, which are now being named for towns with a population of 10,000 or over.

Capt. Norman, Swedish by birth, does not retain any accent of his native tongue. He has been to sea since he was 11 years old and has been through a number of harrowing experiences. During World War II he was 2nd officer of the first ship officially known to have been torpedoed off the Atlantic Coast. (continued)

A Japanese submarine during this war torpedoed his ship from under him and set hi m adrift for 8 days on a raft. One of the lifeboats containing 24 of the crew was adrift for 30 days and had only 5 survivors.

The captain made 12 trips to the Normandy beachhead on the "Louis Kussuth," a Liberty ship, and on the last trip it struck a mine. Fortunately, the Captain made port and with repairs they sailed the ship back to the United States. Captain Norman is now ready to take over the "Waycross Victory," expressing himself as more than satisfied on the performance of the ship and nothing the splendid location of the Victory's officers' quarters.

The "Waycross Victory" has been delivered to the U. S. Maritime Commission and it will be boarded by A. H. Bull & Co., Inc., The Master of the "Waycross Victory" will be Capt. Carl Norman and the Chief Engineer is R. W. Kean – both having had long and commendable records at sea.

The keel for the "Waycross Victory" was laid on June 1, 1945; she was launched on July 20, 1945; and turned over to the Maritime Commission on August 25, 1945; making a total of 74 working days from keel laying to delivery.

The "Waycross Victory" was converted to a troopship; the conversion work being done under a War Shipping Administration contract, and will consist essentially in changes to provide to troop accommodations. These include a gallery, additional food refrigeration facilities, the installation of 19 independent ventilating systems requiring approximately 25 tons of duct-work, and new plumbing, heating, fresh water and sanitary systems. The hatch opening of the ship's five holds will be reduced by about one-third to provide for access ladder to the various berthing areas. Seven hundred tons of sand is being placed in the ship's bottom in addition to a 250-ton cement block on the main deck to improve stability and minimizing rolling of the ship at sea. In order for the cargo space to be quickly transformed into troop berthing, provisions are being made to install tubular stanchions, tiers of bunks will be slung to provide sleeping quarters for the troops.

The S. S. Waycross Victory served as a troop ship until April 25, 1946 at which time it was declared surplus and was consigned to the USNC Reserve Fleet at Hudson River, NJ. The ship was taken to Constable Hook, NJ on February 17, 1947, where it was sold on March 11, 1947 to Aemement Deppe SA; the selling price was \$908,082.56.
