Waycross Sesquicentennial & Ware County Bicentennial When Waycross Was Tebeauville

Those who believe wiregrass history began with Waycross would do well to return to those days of yesteryear.

Older than all the rest of course is Waresboro, a farming community that, save for a desire not to have the railroads disturbing their livestock, might have become the center of South Georgia. But city fathers didn't want that, and later in the 19th century, folks began to congregate nearer the railroad, which, as we all know, came to be centered seven miles to the east.

Drive down to "Old Nine" and journey over this sometimes rough and tumble area. Head west over to Johanna and Bertha streets. There you will find the beginnings of Waycross.

Here the Pendleton family settled in the area we now call "Old Nine," since it was the ninth station on the rail line. "Pendleton" might have become the name of this town, but shortly thereafter Mr. Pendleton took the train to Savannah and caused the little hamlet to be named after his beloved grandfather, Frederic Edmund Tebeau. Thus, during the Civil War, the village was known as "Tebeauville" and it was to Tebeauville that slaves from coastal plantations, such as Brunswick's Broadfield, were brought for "safe-keeping" during the war.

Although Tebeauville never "died out," the center of town eventually moved a mile to the north, where Waycross began, centered at Joseph McQuaig's log cabin which was located where the presentday train depot sits. There on June 21, 1880, Dr. William Folks, along with Col. Haines, other railroad men, and the commissioners of Waycross broke ground directly in front of McQuaig's cabin for the "Waycross Short Line to Florida" and thusly, the ways were made to cross. (McQuaig's living descendants include Mrs. Dorthy Purdom of Waycross and Mrs. Katharine Juvik of Jacksonville. McQuaig Street that runs beside the Elks Lodge honors the contributions of this pioneer settler who moved the home place there, and owned and operated the grist mill for many years that was originally erected by Mr. Stancil.)

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If you want to find Tebeauville, that's easy, because on Friday, May 11, 1917, the Lyman Hall Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution erected a monument to Tebeauville and set it on a spot on the site of the home of Mr. Tebeau, maternal grandfather of the late Charles R. Pendleton.

To go there now is to glimpse only a brief shimmer of the activity that went on in this park on that fateful day. Today only modest residences surround the city block dedicated to the memory of Tebeauville.

There's no hint of the way things were, of the day when "numerous automobile parties" were organized to bring the celebrants to Old Nine for the dedication.

Despite disagreeable weather a large crowd came to witness the unveiling. The program for the ceremony included the singing of "America," an innovation by the Rev. W. H. Scruggs, and introduction of the speaker by the Volney Williams, editor of the Waycross Journal.

Mrs. J. L. Walker, regent of the DAR, then presented the tablet to Waycross Mayor Scott Beaton. Mrs. Mary Parker and Mrs. J. L. Lott unveiled the tablet and the community closed with a group singing of the "Star Spangled Banner." Although time or vandalism has since removed the bronze plaque, it read, "On this site stood the old town of Tebeauville, erected 1917, by the Lyman Hall chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, Waycross, Georgia." Has anyone seen this tablet lately?

Interesting are the comments made by Mayor Beaton. "The good ladies (of the DAR) together with our entire population, rejoice in our city's past, and proudly preserve for future generations the beginning, and the early days of Waycross, when it was not "a crossing of the ways,' but Tebeauville. What Waycross has done since the days of Tebeauville is well worth recording, not alone for what the past holds for us, but more as an inspiration to the present and future generations. When Waycross was Tebeauville... there were men who were filled with faith and could see the Waycross of today, and it is to the spirit of these men that the tablet is dedicated. There are those among us today who are too dull to feel the throbbing purse of an intensely industrial life, but there are others of us who are sensitive to our opportunities and are dreaming big things for the future of Waycross, and it is on behalf of this latter class that I accept with thanks, in the name of the city, this tablet that is to mark for centuries the beginning of Waycross, "The Arcadia of South Georgia."
